# CM 632 Homiletics Fall 2019

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Course Dates: October 21-25, 2019

3 Credit Hours

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

An exploration of a theology of preaching and the preparation and delivery of biblical sermons from the epistles and poetic texts. Students are guided through the foundational disciplines of choosing, exegeting, and preaching a biblical passage.

#### **COURSE INTEGRATION**

This course will introduce student preachers to the theory and practice of carefully encountering biblical texts and crafting these texts into sermons that communicate with faithfulness to the Gospel and sensitivity to their respective ministry contexts.

- C. Follow a systematic approach to sermon preparation.
- D. Deliver two Bible messages with conviction.
- E. Constructively evaluate another's sermon content and delivery, picking up on principles and skills useful for one's own preaching.

#### **ASSIGNMENTS**

### **Pre-Course Assignments:**

1. Book Reviews.

Read the three course textbooks (Banting, Arthurs, and Overdorf – in that order) and write a review of each one. These reviews must identify the author's thesis, summarize and interact with the content of the book and conclude by stating whether you would recommend the book and to whom. Each review is to be **four pages** long.

Value: all the reviews together are worth 15%

Due: October 21, 2019

#### Mid-Course Assignments:

1. Each student will be asked to **present** a 2 to 5-minute devotional thought in class. The content for these presentations should come from the student's own devotional life. These could include a brief introduction to the focus of a text, and then its exposition/application. These devotionals will be shared at different times of the day during the week.

Value: 5%

- 2. Be prepared each day by reviewing the applicable portions of the textbooks and completing the assigned exercises for the activities of the upcoming day. Come prepared to contribute to the class discussion.
- 3. Preach a sermon on an epistolary text in class (on Friday). Students will submit, at the time of preaching, a full manuscript (including the sermon outline) **and** their rough notes. These sermons are to be prepared using the procedure presented in class. The manuscript must be typewritten. **All** (i.e. the manuscript, outline and rough notes) must be handed in at the



due date or the sermon will receive an automatic '0'. The submitted sermon manuscript must include explanatory commentary in parentheses at the end of every paragraph. The preached sermon is to be 20 minutes long (marks will be lost if it is substantially over or under time). The preached sermon is not considered as complete until the one page self-evaluation is submitted.

Value: Written sermon materials – 20 %
Preached sermon (and self-evaluation) – 15%

# Post-Course Assignments:

 Sermon Evaluations. Each student will choose 2 written sermons to evaluate from the list of available sermon collections circulated in class (or some other approved source). This evaluation will be founded upon the characteristics of an effective sermon studied during the week of class. Each evaluation will conclude with three lessons learned about preaching from the sermon under study. Each evaluation is to be 3 pages.

Value: together the evaluations are worth 10%

Due: December 20, 2019

2. Preach a sermon on a poetic text outside of class. Students will submit a video of the sermon as well as a full manuscript (including the sermon outline) and their rough notes. These sermons are to be prepared using the procedure presented in class. The manuscript must be typewritten. All (i.e. the manuscript, outline and rough notes) must be handed in at the due date or the sermon will receive an automatic '0'. The submitted sermon manuscript must include explanatory commentary in parentheses at the end of every paragraph. The preached sermon is to be 20 minutes long (marks will be lost if it is substantially over or under time). The preached sermon is not considered as complete until the one page self-evaluation (distributed in class) is submitted.

Value: Written sermon materials - 20 %

Preached sermon (and self-evaluation) – 15%

Due: December 20, 2019

<u>Note well</u>: the necessity of submitting a full manuscript of the sermon does <u>not</u> necessitate preaching directly from it in class or in the church.
